

# Plaza Added To Edison Heating System

## \$250,000 Line Under Construction

Addition of the Plaza Hotel as a customer on Toledo Edison Co.'s new \$250,000 steam heating system now under construction was announced today by Anthony A. Bosch, Jr., heating supervisor.

The contract with the hotel firm was signed this week to provide heat from a new line presently being laid from Edison's Detroit Ave. station to the Toledo Museum of Art. When the new line is completed, the system will carry steam heat for the first time, after having served customers in the Old West End with hot water heat for 60 years.

The Plaza marks the fourth customer on the new steam line. The others are the Museum, Pinkerton Tobacco Co. and the Edison property on West Delaware Ave.

### Nearing Completion

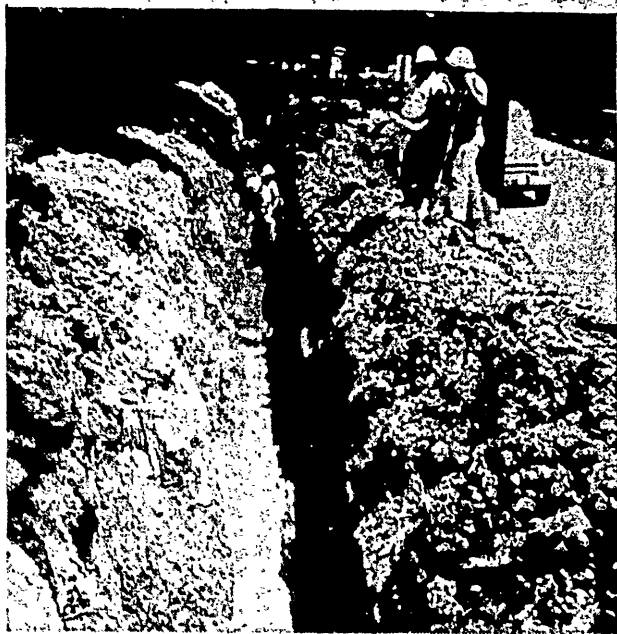
The new mile-long 6-inch steam line is nearing completion from Virginia St. to Detroit Ave. The line, which will follow roughly the same route as the hot water pipe it replaces, is expected to be completed in time for the opening of the heating season on Sept. 15, Mr. Bosch said. Construction started more than a year ago.

Simultaneously with the installation of the new line, both Edison and the Art Museum are making additions to their present facilities. Water conditioner equipment is being installed at Edison's Detroit Ave. station, while the Museum is converting some equipment to handle the steam.

### Converters To Be Used

A. Bentley & Sons Co. are now finishing the Museum project, which will retain the hot water heating system, with live steam from Edison's line being used as the heating element. Converters have been placed in the basement under each of the three wings and the Museum school sections, thus allowing Museum caretakers to close off any section at any time to permit close control of the climate as well as the humidity in the buildings.

Edison's heating system, which was started in 1894, served at its peak in 1921 more than 1,400 buildings in the city using more than 50 miles of pipe.

## Weekly Output Rises At Willys

**647 Passenger Cars,  
1,638 Trucks Made**

Production at Willys Motors, Inc., rose last week to 2,285 units, including 647 passenger vehicles and 1,638 trucks, the company reported today.

The plant turned out 269 Kaiser cars, compared to 106 the previous week, and 378 Willys cars compared to 232 the previous week. Total production this year so far is 4,838 Kaisers and 7,907 Willys.

The automotive industry last week turned out 114,867 cars, including 60,003 by General Motors; 34,415 by Ford, and 14,955 by Chrysler.

In the Ford-Chevrolet standings, Chevrolet again came out on top with 29,400 cars produced, compared to 28,780 by Ford, according to figures of Automotive News.
