of the Water Works was made. With ninety pounds pressure to the square inch, four streams were raised one hundred and twenty feet high. Afterwards eight streams were thrown to a height, sufficient for any practical purpose in this city. With eight of these streams from an inch nozzle, playing upon it at once, a fire would stand but little chance, in any of our buildings.

We venture nothing in the assertion that there is not a city in the Union, or world, better protected against loss by fire, than Connersville. Property here is in much more danger of dam-
