Philadelphia, and the tomb-stones belonging to such remains shall be set over the same: *And provided further*, That in case of a vacancy in the office of minister, the church wardens and a majority of the vestrymen shall have the power to make such rate and conveyances of said property, and ground rents and extinguishments of said ground rents, as though said office was filled.

Proviso.
Corporation to re-pay lot holders for removing dead at their own expense.

SECTION 2. That in every case in which the holders or owners of any of the said burial lots shall, at his or their own cost and expense, remove therefrom the remains of the dead buried therein, and re-inter the same in some other place of sepulture or cemetery, the said corporation shall re-pay, if required so to do, to each of such holders and owners the reasonable expenses of such removal and re-interment.

Conveyance of premises to corporation, and title thereto, ratified and confirmed.

SECTION 3. The conveyance of the said premises above described, on the sixteenth day of January, Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, by Thomas J. Dorsey, Edward W. Venning, Morris Brown, Thomas Charnoch, Franklin Turner, Joseph H. Carter, trustees appointed by the court of common pleas for the county of Philadelphia for that purpose, to the said corporation, and the title thereto of the said corporation is hereby ratified and confirmed, and shall be deemed and taken to vest a good and complete title thereof in and to the said corporation, as though the same had originally been conveyed to said corporation and their successors absolutely; and the said premises, with the appurtenances, is hereby ordered to be and remain firm and stable unto the said minister, church wardens and vestrymen of the African Episcopal Church of St. Thomas, in the city of Philadelphia, their successors and assigns forever.

A Supplement

To an act, entitled "An Act to incorporate the Lycoming Gas and Water Company."

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,*

That the number of managers of the said Lycoming Gas and Water Company shall, after the next annual election for officers of said company, consist of five instead of eight persons; and that at said next annual election the said company shall elect one president and five managers, and the same number annually thereafter. Number of managers fixed.

SECTION 2. That the said company are hereby empowered to make an additional loan to complete their works, and secure the same by a second mortgage on the works and franchises of the company, with accompanying coupon bonds, payable at any time within twenty years, with interest payable semi-annually, in any sum not exceeding one hundred thousand dollars. Authorized to make an additional loan.

SECTION 3. That it shall be lawful for the stockholders of said corporation, at any stated meeting, by vote of a majority in interest, to increase the capital stock in such sum as they may deem expedient, not exceeding the sum of two hundred thousand dollars. No. 660.

An Act

Authorizing the school directors of the borough of Dunmore, in Luzerne county, and the school directors of the borough of Bellefonte, in Centre county, to borrow money.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the school directors of Dunmore borough, Luzerne county, be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to borrow any sum or sums of money, not exceeding six thousand dollars in the whole, at any rate of interest, not exceeding seven per centum per annum, for the purpose of buying real estate and erecting a school house thereon; and it shall be lawful for said board of school directors to secure the payment of the money so borrowed, by bonds or other securities, payable not more than three years from date, which shall be a lien upon the school property of said borough. School directors of Dunmore borough authorized to borrow money.
May secure payment by bonds.
