

POSTSCRIPT!

ANOTHER FIRE!—Just as the Geneva Fire Companies were being received, at the Rail-road Depot, by No. 4, of this city, a fire broke out in a stable, in rear of the United States Hotel, which threatened, for a time, to take a wide range, owing to the dryness of every thing combustible, and the fresh north-western breeze, which about that time sprung up. Happily the fire was arrested before it had progressed far, burning a small barn, two small wood dwellings, and damaging more or less three or four others. Including all destroyed and injured, the loss could hardly have been less than \$2000. The general impression is, that the fire was the work of "Incendiary"—a scape-grace, who performs a large amount of business in this line "here and elsewhere."

VISIT OF THE GENEVA FIREMEN.—Two companies of Firemen from Geneva, paid a visit to our city yesterday, at the invitation of No. 4, and were received at the Depot, at about eleven o'clock, A. M., with that warmth and courtesy which should ever characterize brethren of a common calling. M., the guests were escorted to the Eagle Hotel, where an excellent dinner was provided, and partaken of, with a zest worthy the occasion for which it was prepared. The Auburn and Geneva Bands were both here, and added not a little to the pleasure of the interview. In the evening, the "Melodeon Club" gave a music entertainment at the Eagle, which was warmly applauded by those who enjoyed the pleasure of listening to the creditable performance of the Club.
