- allowed by the board unless supported by vouchers; nor shall any such item for the purchase of books, stationary or other necessities for such schools, or for the compensation of the superintendent, be allowed, unless authorized by a special order of the board; nor any item for tuition, (except where expressly authorized by law,) unless the same be paid on the order of a school commissioner, accompanied with the teacher's account, (in the form prescribed by the second auditor,) and be for an amount not exceeding the rate of six cents per day for each child's attendance.
- Pay of teachers.
- Commencement 2. This act shall be in force from its passage.

CHAP. 35.—An ACT authorizing the payment of the forfeited school quota of Pocahontas county for the year 1852.

Passed March 3, 1854.

- Quota for 1852 to be paid to school commissioners of Pocahontas.
1. Be it enacted by the general assembly, that the second auditor be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue his warrant on the treasury, payable out of any money therein belonging to the Literary fund, and not otherwise appropriated, in favor of William Skeen, (treasurer of the board of school commissioners of Pocahontas county,) for the sum of two hundred and seventy-seven dollars eleven cents, that being the amount of the forfeited school quota for said county, paid by him for the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two.
- Commencement 2. This act shall be in force from its passage.

CHAP. 36.—An ACT making an appropriation to the University of Virginia for certain purposes.

Passed February 28, 1854.

- Appropriation to University of Virginia for repair of buildings. And supply of water.
- How paid.
- Commencement
1. Be it enacted by the general assembly, that the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars be and the same is hereby appropriated to the University of Virginia, for the purpose of repairing and improving the buildings thereof, and for furnishing a supply of water for the protection and preservation of the said buildings and other valuable property of the institution.
2. The appropriation hereby directed shall be paid out of the treasury of the commonwealth, upon the order of the bursar of the university, on the auditor of public accounts, and shall be applied to the purposes named in the first section of this act, and to none others whatsoever.
3. This act shall be in force from its passage.

CHAP. 37.—An ACT to incorporate the Medical College of Virginia.

Passed February 25, 1854.

- Medical college of Virginia incorporated.
- Property of present college vested in them.
- Subject to state lien.
- Instruction in college.
1. Be it enacted by the general assembly of Virginia, that the visitors hereinafter named, and their lawful successors, shall be and are hereby made a body politic and corporate under the name and style of "The Medical College of Virginia," for the purpose of affording instruction in medicine, surgery and the other arts and sciences connected therewith; and the said corporation is hereby invested with all the rights, powers and privileges conferred by the Code upon corporations, and subject to all the rules, regulations, restrictions and provisions of the Code in regard to corporations, so far as the same are applicable to such a corporation as that hereby created.
2. There shall be and is hereby vested in said corporation all the property, real and personal, which now belongs to or is used for the purposes of the Medical college at Richmond, including the college lot, buildings and appurtenances, and the furniture, philosophical and surgical apparatus, anatomical museum, &c.; subject, however, as far as the said real estate is concerned, to the lien which now exists thereon in favor of the president and directors of the Literary fund.
3. There shall be taught at said college all the usual branches of medical education, including especially anatomy, surgery, physiology, the theory and practice of medicine, obstetrics and the diseases of women and children, materia medica, therapeutics, chemistry and pharmacy.
