sale thereof notice shall be given by publication in some newspaper printed in the town of Rutland, of an advertisement, describing such animal, and in no case shall said corporation impose a penalty of more than one dollar beside the actual damage for a single offence.

SEC. 3. The officers of the corporation and persons residing within the limits of the village, are impowered to take up and put into the pound any cattle, horses, mules, donkeys, sheep, swine or geese, that may be found running at large, in violation of any of the by-laws of the village, that have been or may hereafter be adopted by the corporation.

No. 114.—AN ACT RELATING TO THE DUTY OF
WATER COMMISSIONERS IN THE VILLAGE OF
RUTLAND.

It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:

SEC. 1. Whenever the money derived from the use of the water from the aqueduct in the village of Rutland shall amount to more than is necessary to pay the interest upon the bonds issued by said village for the purpose of putting down said aqueduct, and the expenses for the repairs and management of said aqueduct, it shall be the duty of the water commissioners for said village to apply the excess of said money to the payment of the debts incurred, and to the purchase of the bonds issued by said village for said aqueduct.
